- 7. The applicant and municipality executed a Host Community Agreement on March 1, 2022.
- 8. The applicant conducted a community outreach meeting on January 12, 2022 and provided documentation demonstrating compliance with Commission regulations.
- 9. The Commission sent a municipal notice with a copy of the application to the City/Town of Petersham on June 10, 2022. The Commission did not receive a response within 60 days pursuant to 935 CMR 500.102(1)(d).
- 10. The applicant proposed the following goals for its Plan to Positively Impact Disproportionately Harmed People:

1	Give preference to contracting with suppliers, contractors and vendors owned
	by residents of ADIs, specifically Fitchburg, Greenfield, Amherst, and
	Holyoke (10%), economic empowerment recipients (5%), social equity
	recipients (10%), Massachusetts residents with past drug conviction (2.5%),
	and Massachusetts residents with parents or spouses with past drug
	convictions (2.5%).
2	Encourage its staff to engage with, and contribute to, local nonprofit
	organizations with a mission that benefits areas of disproportionate impact by
	allowing each employee to use up to 10 hours per year of paid time to
	volunteer in the community, with a target goal of 40 aggregated hours.
3	Match up to \$500 per employee per year with a target goal of \$2,000
	aggregated donations, and the company will make corporate donations even
	in the absence of staff donations.

- 3. Final licensure is subject to the applicant providing Commission staff, upon inspection, with a detailed list of all proposed products to be produced with specific information as to types, forms, shapes, colors, and flavors.
- 4. The applicant shall cooperate with and provide information to Commission staff.
- 5. Provisional licensure is subject to the payment of the appropriate license fee.
- 6. Final licensure is subject to the applicant providing Commission of its "Additional Operational Plans for Outdoor Marijuana Cultivators" as it relates to Quality Control Samples. Licensees that opt to provide Quality Control Samples must include written policies and procedures in accordance with 935 CMR 500.120(12)(i), and 935 CMR 500.120(14).
- 7. Final licensure is subject to the applicant providing Commission of its "Additional Operational Plans for Product Manufacturers" as it relates to Quality Control Samples. Licensees that opt to provide Quality Control Samples must include written policies and procedures in accordance with 935 CMR 500.130(5)(k) and 935 CMR 500.130(9).

The applicant has demonstrated compliance with the laws and regulations of the Commonwealth and suitability for licensure. Therefore, the applicant is recommended for provisional licensure.
