

## Responsible Vendor Training Application Checklist: Basic Core Curriculum

This checklist is a guide for those applying to be a Cannabis Control Commission-certified Responsible Vendor Trainer.

Ι.	Responsible Vendor Trainers must provide a minimum of four hours of training.
II.	Responsible Vendor Trainers may present courses in a virtual format provided the Responsible Vendor Trainer can demonstrate means:  ☐ To verify the identification of each trainee participating in the course and certify completion by the individual;  ☐ To track trainees' time needed to complete the course;  ☐ To allow for the trainees to ask questions of the Responsible Vendor Trainer, for example, by email, virtual discussion board, or group/class discussion; and  ☐ To evaluate each trainee's attendance and proficiency with course material.
III.	The Responsible Vendor Trainer shall maintain training records at its principal places of business for four years.  ☐ Responsible Vendor Trainers shall make the records available for inspection by the Cannabis Control Commission (Commission) and any other applicable licensing authority on request during normal business hours.
IV.	<ul> <li>Language requirements</li> <li>□ Trainees who can speak and write English fluently successfully demonstrate proficiency, such as passing a written test with a score of 70% or better;</li> <li>□ Trainees who cannot speak or write English may receive a verbal evaluation or test, provided the same questions are on the written test and the results of the verbal test are documented with a passing score of 70% or better.</li> </ul>

		An ME authorized to process marijuana shall do so in a safe and sanitary manner;
		An ME shall process the leaves and flowers of the female marijuana plant only,
		which shall be:
		<ul> <li>Well cured and generally free of seeds and stems;</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li>Free of dirt, sand, debris, and other foreign matter;</li> </ul>
		o Free of contamination by mold, rot, other fungus, and bacterial diseases;
		o Prepared and handled on food-grade stainless steel tables; and
		Packaged in a secure area.
		Any Agent whose job includes contact with marijuana or non-edible marijuana
		products, including cultivation, production, or packaging, is subject to the

	Hand-washing facilities shall be adequate and convenient and shall be furnished
	with running water at a suitable temperature;
	Hand-washing facilities shall be located in the ME/MTC in production areas and where good sanitary practices require employees to wash and sanitize their hands, and shall provide effective hand-cleaning and sanitizing preparations and sanitary towel service or suitable drying devices;
	There shall be sufficient space for placement of equipment and storage of
	materials as is necessary for the maintenance of sanitary operations;
	Litter and waste shall be properly removed, disposed of so as to minimize the development of odor, and minimize the potential for the waste attracting and harboring pests. The operating systems for waste disposal shall be maintained in an adequate manner pursuant to 935 CMR 500.105(12);
	Floors, walls, and ceilings shall be constructed in such a manner that they may be adequately kept clean and in good repair;
	There shall be adequate safety lighting in all processing and storage areas, as well as areas where equipment or utensils are cleaned;
	Buildings, fixtures, and other physical facilities shall be maintained in a sanitary condition;
	All contact surfaces, including utensils and equipment, shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition. Such surfaces shall be cleaned and sanitized as frequently as necessary to protect against contamination, using a sanitizing agent registered by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), in accordance with labeled instructions. Equipment and utensils shall be so designed and of such material and workmanship as to be adequately cleanable;
	All toxic items shall be identified, held, and stored in a manner that protects against contamination of marijuana products;
	An ME's water supply shall be sufficient for necessary operations. Any private water source shall be capable of providing a safe, potable, and adequate supply of water to meet the ME's needs;
	Plumbing shall be of adequate size and design, and adequately installed and maintained to carry sufficient quantities of water to required locations throughout the ME. Plumbing shall properly convey sewage and liquid disposable waste from the ME. There shall be no cross-connections between the potable and wastewater lines;
	An ME shall provide its employees with adequate, readily accessible toilet
	facilities that are maintained in a sanitary condition and in good repair;



	Products that can support the rapid growth of undesirable microorganisms shall be held in a manner that prevents the growth of these microorganisms;
	Storage and transportation of finished products shall be under conditions that will protect them against physical, chemical, and microbial contamination as well as against deterioration of finished products or their containers;
	All vehicles and transportation equipment used in the transportation of marijuana products or edibles requiring temperature control for safety must be designed, maintained, and equipped as necessary to provide adequate temperature control to prevent the marijuana products or edibles from becoming unsafe during transportation, consistent with applicable requirements pursuant to $21 \ CFR$ $1.908(c)$ ;
	All MEs, including those that develop or process edible marijuana products, shall comply with sanitary requirements. All edible products shall be prepared, handled, and stored in compliance with the sanitation requirements in 105 CMR 590.000: Minimum Sanitation Standards for Food Establishments;
	All edible marijuana products shall be prepared, handled, and stored in compliance with the sanitation requirements in 105 CMR 500.000: Good Manufacturing Practices for Food, and with the requirements for food handlers specified in 105 CMR 300.000: Reportable Diseases, Surveillance, and Isolation and Quarantine Requirements; and
	Any marijuana product that is made to resemble a typical food or beverage product must be packaged and labelled as required by 935 CMR 500.105(5) and 500.105(6).
Pa	trons prohibited from bringing marijuana onto licensed premises
	Unless a license expressly permits such conduct, patrons may not bring marijuana onto a licensed premise:  Example: medical patients are permitted to bring unused, excess, or contaminated products to the Medical Marijuana Treatment Center(MTC) where they purchased the product for disposal (935 CMR 501.105(12): Patient Education).

	Staff must know permitted hours of business as set by the Commission and/or amended by the municipality.

		Marijuana Cultivator: may cultivate, process, and package marijuana, to transport marijuana to ME/MTCs and to transfer marijuana to other ME/MTCs, but not to consumers. A Marijuana Cultivator may not exceed the canopy allowed by its tier	
		until expansion is approved by the Commission;	
		<i>Craft Marijuana Cooperative:</i> may cultivate, obtain, manufacture, process, package, and brand marijuana products to deliver marijuana to ME/MTCs, but not to consumers. It may only hold one license but may have unlimited cultivation locations while staying within its tier limits. It may have 3 locations for product manufacturing;	
		Marijuana Product Manufacturer: may obtain, manufacture, process, and package marijuana products, to transport marijuana products to ME/MTCs and to transfer marijuana products to other ME/MTCs, but not to consumers;	
		Marijuana Retailer: may purchase and transport marijuana products from ME/MTCs and to transport, sell, or otherwise transfer marijuana products to ME/MTCs and to consumers. A retailer cannot deliver marijuana products to consumers or allow on-site social consumption by consumers on the premises of the ME/MTC;	
		Marijuana Research Facility: may cultivate, purchase, or otherwise acquire marijuana for the purpose of conducting research regarding marijuana products. Any research involving humans must be authorized by an Institutional Review Board (IRB). A research facility may not sell marijuana cultivated under its research license. All research regarding marijuana must be conducted by individuals 21 years of age or older;	
		Independent Testing Laboratory: must be accredited as required under 935 CMR 500; no executive or member of an ME/MTC may have any financial or other interest in an Independent Testing Laboratory providing testing services for any ME; no individual employee of a laboratory providing testing services for ME/MTCs may receive direct or indirect financial compensation from any ME/MTC;	
		Standards Laboratory: must meet requirements of Independent Testing Laboratories, but an Independent Testing Laboratory may not serve as a Standards Laboratory; may test samples upon request by Commission in a manner determined by the Commission so as not to reveal to the laboratory the source of the marijuana products;	
		Third-Party Transporter: an entity registered to do business in Massachusetts that	
		does not hold another ME license pursuant to 035 CMP 500 050 and is not	



		registered an MTC that may transport marijuana, marijuana products, and money on behalf of an ME; may warehouse marijuana and marijuana products as determined by the Commission;
		Existing Licensee Transporter: an ME/MTC that wishes to contract with other MEs to transport their marijuana, marijuana products, and money to other ME/MTCs; may warehouse marijuana and marijuana products as determined by the Commission;
		Microbusiness: a Tier 1 Marijuana Cultivator or Product Manufacturer or both; may purchase no more than 2,000 pounds of marijuana per year from other ME/MTCs; may not have an ownership stake in any other ME; and
		Marijuana Delivery Operator or Delivery Operator: an entity licensed to purchase at Wholesale and Warehouse Finished Marijuana Products acquired from a Marijuana Cultivator, Marijuana Product Manufacturer, Microbusiness, or Craft Marijuana Cooperative, and White Label, sell and deliver Finished Marijuana Products, Marijuana Accessories, and Marijuana Branded Goods directly to consumers, but is not authorized to repackage marijuana or marijuana products or operate a storefront under this license. A Delivery Operator is an additional license type under G.L. c. 94G, § 4(b)(1) that allows for limited delivery of marijuana or marijuana products to consumers; and shall not be considered to be a Marijuana Retailer under 935 CMR 500.002: Definitions or 935 CMR 500.050: MEs and shall be subject to 935 CMR 500.050(1)(b): Control Limitations.
XVII.	Pe	rmitting inspections by state and local licensing and enforcement authorities
		The Commission or its agents may inspect an ME/MTC and affiliated vehicles at any time without prior notice in order to determine the ME's compliance;
		All areas of an ME/MTC, all ME/MTC Agents and activities, and all records are subject to inspection;
		Upon request, an ME/MTC must immediately make available to the Commission all information that may be relevant to a Commission inspection, or an investigation of any incident or complaint;
		An ME/MTC must make all reasonable efforts to facilitate the Commission's inspection, or investigation of any incident or complaint, including the taking of samples, photographs, video, or other recordings by the Commission or its agents and to facilitate the Commission's interviews of ME/MTC Agents;
		An inspection or other investigation may be made prior to the issuance of a license or renewal of registration. Additional inspections may be made whenever the Commission deems it necessary for enforcement;



		During an inspection, the Commission may direct an ME/MTC to test marijuana for contaminants as specified by the Commission, including but not limited to mold, mildew, heavy metals, plant-growth regulators, and the presence of pesticides not approved for use on marijuana by the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources (MDAR);
		ME/MTCs or ME/MTC vehicles may be inspected by Commission staff,
		representatives of other state agencies of the Commonwealth, and emergency
		responders in the course of responding to an emergency;
		Commission regulations shall not be construed to prohibit access to authorized
		law enforcement personnel or local public health, inspectional services, or other permit-granting agents acting within their lawful jurisdiction; and
		Access to limited-access areas shall be restricted to employees, agents, or
		volunteers specifically permitted by the ME/MTC, agents of the Commission,

	Securing product following any instance of diversion, theft, or loss of Finished Marijuana Products pursuant to 935 CMR 500.110(1)(m);	
	Collecting and communicating information to assist in investigations;	
	Procedures for checking an identification, understanding that with a pre-	
	verification system there may be a process that is different than a traditional	
	identification check because the delivery Agent would need to have/obtain the	
	pre-certified information and check against it;	
	Indications of impairment; and	
	Notification to consumers of use of mandatory recording devices.
